TREASURY CHAMBERS.

Sir,

In reply to Mr. Fiddes' letter of the 1st instant (2302/11), I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to request you to inform Mr. Secretary Harcourt that They see no objection to the proposal of the Crown Agents for the Colonies that the order for silver subsidiary coins for the East Africa Protectorate to the nominal value of Rs. 10,000 in 25 cent pieces should be placed with the Birmingham Mint at the prices quoted, viz. 11s. per 1000 pieces packed and delivered free on board at London or Liverpool.

In view of the provisions of Clause 5 (1) of the East Africa and Uganda (Currency) Order in Council 1905 it is desirable that contracts such as that now in question should be arranged by the Deputy Master of the Royal Mint.

In the present case however My Lords are prepared to regard that provision is satisfied by the Deputy Master's approval of the terms of the contract and by the inspection of the coinage in question by officers of his Department.
