
I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Fiddes' letter of the 10th instant (3256/1911) further respecting the proposed revision of the Leave and Passage Rules for the East Africa Protectorate, Uganda and Nyasaland.

Mr. Secretary Harcourt states that if the new rules are adopted it will be clearly understood by officers in the Protectorates that no applications for special acting allowances can be entertained, and in view of this assurance and of the further explanations afforded My Lords now consent to the adoption of the new rules, with the modification of Regulation 8 suggested by the Secretary of State, without further question.
