On Governor/2776 we have approved of Mr. McLean, a District Commissioner in the East Africa Protectorate, drawing £400 a year, being seconded for employment as a Recorder of Titles in the Protectorate for a period of three years and of his place in the administrative staff being filled in the mean time. We trust, of course, to being able to make arrangements to reabsorb him if he gives up the appointment at the end of the three years and wants to return to his administrative duties.

This is a ~~piece~~ promotion of promotion which could not have been looked for in the ordinary course by the administrative staff of the Protectorate and I think the opportunity should be taken to dispose of one of the two retrenched Somaliland officials whose cases are still outstanding.

Captain Dansey (File 1867) was drawing £500 a year as a political officer in Somaliland when he was retrenched. It has not yet been found possible to offer him any other employment. He is known as a capable officer ~~but~~ was drawing a comparatively high salary and it is known that he would not accept anything less than the District Commissionership or an post of that sort of the lowest grade of a political department. Until now we have been able to do for him so far as to get him a small pension of £75 a year. He is very sore at his inability to find him further employment, and there will be real difficulty with him if we are entirely unable to do so.

I think, therefore, that he should have the first refusal of this vacancy. The loss of salary of £100 a year must be set against the wider opportunities given by appointment to the staff of so large a Protectorate as the East African Protectorate. Even if the wages we shall be in a much better position with regard to him than if we had made him no offer at all.

If he does refuse, I think the appointment might be offered to Captain C. R. E. Jorgensen, who was drawing \$400 a year as an Assistant Political Officer in Somaliland when he was retrenched. He has received appointment in command of Southern Somalia at the same salary as he draws, but he would consent to go in even that salary at the bottom of a long list of Assistant District Commissioners. He is an able officer and it would be a pity to lose him entirely from the service. The hardship involved in the new or former employment if this idea is adopted, are likely to be very great if the official concerned in the matter is left to himself. It is to be apprehended that he will be induced to apply to the Governor for appointment to the unoccupied vacancy in the administration which he holds as a District Commissioner of a retrenched Colony as an officer of standing and experience, and say that he should hold out no hope of local promotion to the vacancy. Sir P. Denby will no doubt desire to keep the place for one of his own staff, but I think that our obligations towards these retrenched officers must over-ride his wishes in this case.

A formal offer should be made to Captain Denby, and failing him to Captain Jorgensen. We should eventually explain to the Governor to despatch the considerations which

He has described his appointment in Northern or Southern Somaliland as the same salary on the ground that he cannot consent to do in even half the salary at the bottom of a long list of assistants at District Commissioners. He is an able officer and would be a pity to lose him part from the question of the hardship involved if he were so far removed from his old post. If this idea is acceptable, the next step would be to telegraph to the Governor of Mombasa and the Protectorate that it is proposed to fill the above vacancy in the administrative staff by the appointment of a District Commissioner of a retrenched Somaliland officer of standing and experience, and say him he should hold out no hopes of local promotion to the Vacancy. Sir P. Macmillan will no doubt desire to keep the place for one of his own staff, but I think that our obligations towards these retrenched officers must override his wishes in this case.

A formal offer should be made to Captain Dansey, and failing him to Captain Jorgensen. We should eventually explain to the Governor by despatch the considerations which
