I have the honour
to acknowledge the receipt
of your despatch No. 3375/11
of the 20th instant, transmitting
copies of correspondence on
the subject of the introduction
of a system of combined
revenue stamp on cheques
and other documents in
the East Africa and
Uganda Protectorates.

2. I thank it is
conclusively shown, in the
Answer of the Secretary of
State for War of January 9th last, that the
use of self-recording
process would not meet
the case of East Africa
or Uganda.

3. That, prior to the receipt of your despatch, already consulted the Crown Agents on the subject and, as a result of my enquiries, would recommend the adoption of the system of adhesive stamps with over-embossment as described in "Mme. Dos de la Rue's & Co's "Report upon stamping of documents," dated October 1901.

4. I learn from the Crown Agents that new value stamps could be printed at a cost of £16 for each set of overprint due and flat provided the new stamp were of the same shape and size as the high value postage revenue stamps at present in use in the Protectorate concerned.

5. If, however, it is desired to introduce a special revenue stamp of the

"long"

"long" shape, commonly used for this purpose, a further cost of £50 would be entailed for a special key die and key plate, the overprint dies & plates costing £16 the pair as before.

6. There does not appear to me to be any reason to incur this additional expenditure. Higher value stamps of the existing pattern would in my opinion meet the case.

7. The cost of the new dies & plate, which would be for Revenue purposes only, would presumably be divided between the two Protectorates, together with the cost of printing, which is estimated at six shillings a thousand with a minimum charge of one pound sixteen shillings.

8. As regards the new value

values of stamps which
would be required, I have
the honour to suggest that
Capt. J. C. Ward, Present
Registrar of Document for
the East Africa Protectorate,
who is at present in England,
be consulted. This officer
would also be in a position
to state what would be
required in the way of
a full and accurate set
of models, scales and tables.

9. I consider the Company
arrangement which has been
adopted for the stamp
duty on cheques could be
continued for some time
to come. I gather that it
is sanctioned in Leyton
as a permanent arrangement
and there does not appear to
be any especial advantage
in adopting the more
expensive and lengthy
system of embossed stamps
for this sum to Revenue.
