Sir,

I have recently had an opportunity of discussing with Colonel Seely the question of the possiss bility of the imposition of a general direct tax of some class upon the East African community.

As matters stand today, the native only is subject to direct taxation; the Indian and European pay indirectly. The form which native taxation assumes is but or poll tax. The poll tax is not one which I would desire to see extended to more civilised individuals; the but tax, or what might be more clearly described an "Inhabited House tax" is however one which might be considered both fair and desirable.

I would be glad to know whether proposals in this direction could receive the approval or consideration of the Secretary of State.
