Sir,

In the event of the retirement from the Protectorate service of Mr. Zaphiro, which is at present under consideration, I would beg to suggest the necessity of an early appointment of a suitable officer in his place for the important work now being carried on along the Abyssinian border.

It is essential to, if possible, obtain the services of someone cognizant of the frontier situation, and such an officer would appear to be available in Lieut. L. Aylmer of the 60th Rifles, who was recently employed for several years with the Kings African Rifles on frontier duty. It will be within your recollection that this officer's services with the Protectorate were extended for a few months to enable him to hand over his work to his successor prior to his return to his regiment. He is now, I understand, anxious to again take up Colonial service, and if the War Office could be persuaded to place his services at the disposal of the Colonial Department, I trust that his appointment to the vacancy may meet with approval.

I would propose that he should be graded as the junior District Commissioner, funds having been provided in the Estimates for the appointment of Mr. Zaphiro on this scale.
