I had the privilege of meeting yesterday, with Solonel Seely, members of the Society for the preservation of Wild Fauna in the Empire.

The Society wish to lay before the Secretary of State the desirability of increasing the weight of tusks for elegannts to be shot an Uganda to at least 25 lcs. You will be aware that the legal weight in British Fast Africa is new 30 lbs.

Though I do not press for any immediate alteration in this standard, and though I do not look light the Government revenues derived from ivory as of great importance, it is only right that I should state the fact that in the present condition of standards, a considerable trade in ivory is being diverted from British East Africa into the adjoining British Protectarate. satisfied with the measures which had been adopted in Iritish East Africa. With regard to elephant shooting in Uganda, I could not speak with any personal knowledge, but the proposal put forward by the council, that only Administrative officers or cartain specified natives should be authorised to keep down the sumber of elephants to avoid depredation, appeared to resulunworkable one. The ordinary Administrative officer

for too busily employed in his ordinary event ore to be turned into a big rame hunter, the time killing of the phants is a course fraught with great danger to the unimals it is sought to protect.

Though in East Africa we are not troubled by any great depredations from elephonts, there is any other source of evil maich is a very great one. refer to the presence of the Southern Game Reserve; practically in contact with a large mumber of European farms and Native Reserves. Though the Society viewed with a certain amount of equanimity the re-uction of elephants in Uganda - by administrative methods - to a point where they could not somet excessive damage, they eppeared totally unwilling to in any way consider a similar situation, now becoming very grave, owing to the presence of enormous herds principally of hartebeeste and zebra. One member contended that as the game was there before the settler, the settler should be moved - where to, was not ascertainable. And Such an attitude exemplifies the general the Society

No innabitant in British East Africa would desire to see any general extermination of case, and it is also rendered practically impossible by the fact that by far the larger proportion of acreage in the country will not withers any form of settlement beyond that of nomadic tribes for many years to come. There are fully 100,000 square miles of country which come under this category. The present Southern Came Reserve is on an entirely different footing. It is to-day closely in contact with civilization, and no less

an authority than Sir David Bruce has definitely stated that it is quite impossible to carry on farming operations with the presence of this game serve. I have mentioned the fact that the construction of a Game fence as from Nairobi to Kiu, along the railway line, might in a measure prove effectual, though I have grave doubts of it and the expenditure on such a project would hardly be justifiable. I may state incidentally that the Council objected to even a Game fence - on aeashetic grounds.

I am of opinion that the present Southern massi Reserve should be thrown open to shooting, and that furthermore the Game Rangers should be authorised to decide the number of any animals, such as hartebessed and sebra, which could - in accordance with the views of this Society - be reduced in order to afford protection to farming operations.

The Society objected in every way to the export of hides and skins, but unless farmers can recoup themselves in some way for the heavy expenditure of ammunition which is entailed by the destruction of game, even where authorised by Government, euch destruction becomes impossible. I do not think that the farmers would desire to kill off the game from the point of view of peuniary interest. It appears to me that some measure could be devised whereby the Government could make itself responsible for the export and sale of any such hides, wherefrom the expense incurred by farmers could be recouped, and any balances

balances placed to the credit of the Game Department.

The position is today in this regard a serious one, and the proposals I have outlined to not appear to differ very widely from those put forward by this Council with regard to the reduction of elephants in the Uganda Protectorate.
