Mr. Butler said that the Secretary of State
^{to Mr. Heatley} had agreed to the grant of another 10,000 acres for
stock farming, and he thought that if Mr. Heatley pro-
posed to turn the area originally granted to him on the
Kwelti River into a game reserve the further grant should
be revoked. Mr. Heatley had informed the Government that
he wanted the land for cattle raising and Mr. Butler
therefore asked whether any definite notice in regard
to the additional area had been given locally. The
Governor said that he did not know ^{and} that Mr. Heatley was
now in America where he had floated a Company with a
capital of £50,000 for taking over his own and Mr.
McMillan's properties as a game club. The Governor
thought that the matter should be left to the local
Executive and Legislative Councils; but Mr. Reid was of
opinion that further information should be obtained, as,
if the application were granted, the Government could be
charged with inconsistency if they allowed a new
game preserve to be opened while they were actually
closing one elsewhere. In addition it was necessary that the
neighbouring landholders should be safeguarded from the
game; and the question of the possibility of the area
becoming a breeding place for the water ^{flora} had also to
be considered. Mr. Heatley had given very little ex-
planation of his intentions, though it was understood
that the game would comprise ostriches and buffalo;
and it was thought that fencing was of little use for
preventing the animals from staying. Colonel Seely
was of opinion that further information was necessary.

2. Mr. Heatley.



Mr. Heatley, with two partners, had three farms on the Kamiti River. A very considerable sum of money was spent on them and he certainly fulfilled all conditions prior to transfer, which was granted him some years ago. He suffered from time to time very severely from East Coast fever, which entailed much loss to him in stock.

In consequence of his having more or less well developed these farms, he asked last year for a further grant of three farms further up in the highlands, urging upon me the necessity for having a different part of the country for carrying on a ranching business. The Secretary of State eventually agreed to three farms being allotted to Mr. Heatley and his partners, in view of the considerable sum of money that had been spent on developing Kamiti Ranch.

After Mr. Heatley's departure from East Africa last summer, I became aware of the fact that he was negotiating with certain Americans the terms for the conversion of his three farms on the Kamiti into a Big Game Club. I saw him on my arrival here and informed him that I could not see any way to supporting him in this matter, and that it would be highly desirable to secure the opinion of both of colonists and of Government prior to allowing a Game reserve to be built up in the middle of farms. I pointed out that the extra grants of land were given him with the idea that he would continue the development of his lower farms on an agricultural or pastoral basis, but if it was now agreed that he could sell these lower farms at a profit as a Game Club, I could not see that Government was under any obligation to furnish him with other land.
