I have received your letter of the 27th. insto. and I note that the conditions attached to the proposal of 16th. March are not such as Sir Percy Girouard and Mr. Secretary Harcourt think the Government should accept.

I would ask you, however, to note that my said proposal was not intended as a final one, and that the conditions I attached thereto are subject to such adjustment or modification as may be found necessary.

If you let me know in what respects the conditions are, in the view of the Governor and Mr. Secretary unacceptable, I shall endeavour to submit such an amended proposal as will meet the views of the Government.
