I have been in correspondence with the Secretary of State for Colonies with a view to my being granted a leasehold concession land in the Protectorate, bounded approximately, on the West by the centre of the Sankoki Hills; on the North by a line parallel with the eastern shores of lake Jelori, but about two miles south thereof; and on the East by the Native Reserve, the line being continued northerwards as the boundary of the fibre area - (See map and tracing for full location).

The objects for which a leasehold is desired are:

1. The gathering of the old dead Rubber Vines which have been destroyed by natives.
2. The clearing of the undergrowth in order to encourage the growth of the young shoots of the Rubber Vines and the cutting and extraction of Rubber therefrom.
3. The selling of the growing timber and the planting of other approved trees or plants in place thereof.

On the 14th inst. I had an interview at the Colonial Office with His Excellency the Governor of the Protectorate who suggested that I should make application in setting out exactly my desires.

His Excellency informed me that leaseholds are granted at about 2/- per acre RENTAL and also that no Native Rights can be alienated. This latter stipulation I have respected in the area marked in red on the sketch map enclosed, which was supplied to me on the order of the Secretary of State.

I shall be glad to hear that the area in question for so considerable portion thereof should the whole area not be required be on my complying with the above conditions.
