With reference to our interview with you, we are instructed by Lord Delamere and other relatives of the family of the Hon. Galbraith Cole in connection with the Order made by the Government on your instructions directing the deportation of the Hon. Galbraith Cole from the East Africa Protectorate.

We called upon you in an endeavour to obtain certain information and material to enable us to advise our Clients the exact position, which we understand cannot be given to us except through the usual channels and by correspondence only.

Meantime, we understand that the period allotted under the Order for Deportation for the Hon. Galbraith Cole to leave the Protectorate expires on the 9th instant, and we should be glad if you would grant our application to extend the time so as to permit us of obtaining what is necessary to inform our Clients the exact position. As directed when we called, we beg to enumerate the following questions, to which we should be glad to have as early a reply as possible:-

(a) Whether you can supply us with the date of and we can inspect or you can supply us with a copy of the Order of Deportation in question;

(b) Whether we can inspect or you can supply us with a

(a) Whether we can inspect or you can supply us with a copy of your evidence in each witness to the trial to whom the witness gave the name.

(b) Whether the evidence is the whole or part of the evidence in each witness to the trial of the Hon. Smith Cole for murder or culpable homicide.

(c) Whether we can inspect or you can supply us with a copy of the proceedings on the enquiry that was proposed to be held upon the matter in the House of Commons.

We may add that the matter is of the greatest importance to the Hon. Galbraith Cole and to our Clients, and we must ask you to accept this as our reason for troubling you with so much detail.
