Mr. Read,

With reference to the vacancies now existing for Assistant District Superintendents of Police in British East Africa, I understand the question is being raised as to why certain Assistant Inspectors who are qualified in most ways for promotion should not now be so promoted in preference to choosing new men from Home.

I understand that one of these men is Mr. Skinner, appointed as recently as October 1910, and who was distinctly told with his letter of appointment that he would have the status of a Non-commissioned officer.

The only justification for Mr. Skinner's appointment as Assistant District Superintendent of Police, apart from his social qualifications, is the fact that he was a Constable in the South African Constabulary from 1906 to 1909.

The whole question of the position of Inspectors of Police in British East Africa requires very careful consideration, and seems to have been dealt with in the past in a somewhat haphazard fashion. It would I think be highly undesirable to promote junior officers like Mr. Skinner, with practically no Police knowledge, to the rank of Asst. District Supt. and thereby place them in direct command of old Inspectors of Police who may have from 5 to 10 years knowledge of police work.

The courses only appear to be open, either that it should be definitely settled that all Inspectors of Police should be chosen from amongst the European Police constables, who in their turn should be of that social status which would not make it desirable to promote them to a Commissioned rank, or that all should be chosen in such a manner as to warrant eventual promotion to the rank of Assistant District Superintendent of Police.

If the Inspectors are chosen apart from the constables and made eligible for promotion, the constables have very little to look forward to, and inevitably become discontented. On the other hand, if all the lower ranks are to be considered eligible for promotion to Commissioned rank, undesirable or difficult situations might in the case of certain individuals arise.

I do not think that in the present instance, owing to the short police experience of certain police Inspectors who might be looked upon otherwise as qualified for promotion, that it is in any way desirable to promote them. I would prefer that the whole matter should be referred back to the Government of the Protectorate with the request that I should be consulted as to a final recommendation upon my return.

Cause of vacancies. Promotions to rank of Superintendent in accordance with Supplementary Police Report E.A.P. paragraph 19, 20. (p. 104/30668 E.A.P.)

Remarks:

1. The appointments are pensionable (3 years probation).
2. Required as soon as possible.
3. They will not go through the Royal Irish Constabulary Course.
4. Inspector General of Police urges the necessity of "most careful selection".

For Assistant Inspectors he always prefers men with Colonial Police experience, and presumably he prefers such men (e.g. Mr. Walsley Bourne) for these commissioned ranks also.
