This Report was discussed on 15th December by a Committee consisting of Sir P. Girouard, Mr. Rea and Mr. Butler.

The Committee expressed themselves in favour of the proposals generally as regards the re-organization of the Prisons Department, subject to certain alterations in the matter of salaries.

Paragraph 58 A. The Inspector General of Police and Prisons (Captain Edwards) should remain on his present scale of salary, viz. \$600-25-£800 but he should have a duty allowance of £10 per annum, £20 of which should be paid by Uganda, as it is proposed that he should also be Inspector of Prisons in that Protectorate (U.E. Uganda Government has not yet been consulted on the matter).

The "Deputy Assistant Commissioner of Prisons" (Mr. Gray) should be styled "Inspector of Prisons" and should be placed on an incremental scale of salary, viz. £300-15-£400 with \$30 duty allowance. He should start at £345 in this scale.

B; C; D. The salaries and posts to be as in the draft Estimates 1911-12, wherever there is any divergence between the Report and the Estimates.

Paragraph 59. As for the rank of B. E.

Paragraph 62. The Quarter Master (Mr. Ellis) to receive duty allowance of £10 for acting as Quarter Master of the Prisons Department.

Paragraph 57. To be dealt with in accordance with the Estimates 1911-12 (Public Works Department Extraordinary).
