Sir,

I have the honour to transmit herewith two copies of a Third Supplementary Estimate for £3,615 for the year 1911-12, as passed by the Legislative Council on the 12th ultimo, together with a Memorandum by the Treasurer giving full explanation of each item.

2. The expenditure on this third Supplementary Estimate will be met, as stated in the Memorandum, from General Savings and Reallocation, and will not affect the estimated surplus balance of £164.828 on the 31st March 1912.

3. With regard to the 15 "Margaret Patrol" I would ask, in view of the special circumstances of the case, for permission to meet the expenditure of £600 out of surplus balances, as, although it is possible that savings to this extent may exist at the present moment, there will probably be excesses to provide for from that source before the end of the financial year.

4. I trust therefore that you will give your approval to this proposal, and that the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury will be able to

Item 1. Mr.D.J.Wilson's (late Director of Government Transport and Principal Immigration Officer) pension from 16th December 1911 to 31st March 1912 at the rate of £294 per annum, sanctioned in Colonial Office Despatch of 1st November 1911, and apportioned as follows:-

East Africa Protectorate £139

Uganda Protectorate £155.

Item 2. Capt.E.R.Hayes Sadler's (late Aide-de-Camp to the former Governor) pension contribution to the Government of India for the period from 1st October to 4th December 1910, sanctioned in C.O. despatch No. 466 of 30th July 1910. Met from General Savings.

Item 3. Cost of a single first class passage to London of Capt. C.J.Murray, Aide-de-Camp to His Excellency the Governor. This expenditure could not be foreseen when the estimates were prepared. Met from General Savings.

Item 4. An indent for printing machinery was forwarded in January 1911 to the Crown Agents for execution and payment during 1910-11, but the account was not paid till the current financial year. Met from General Savings.

Item 5. Amount allowed on Estimates for current year for station hands at Bubu has proved insufficient to keep the station decent and in a sanitary state. A sum of Rs 5 is required to the end of the year. Met from General Savings.

Item 6. In the current year's estimates the Vote for Local Travelling was reduced from Rs 500 to Rs 200: the latter sum has proved insufficient, and Rs 7½ is required. Met from General Savings.

Item 7. The engagement of porters have been found to meet the needs of the recently established Post at Bubu. Met from General Savings.

Referring to the absence and impossibility of employing 8 clerks expeditiously with the consequence, and the temporary engaged on a monthly salary ending Rs. 75, have been allowed up to the 31st March. Met from Savings Advisory Vote.

Item 8. Additional provision necessary to meet cost of passages of the reconstituted districts; more clerks proceede in leave also than anticipated when estimate was framed. Met from savings on Judicial vote.

Item 9. It has been found necessary to employ 10 temporary Constables in Tanaikand Province until Semakie move from Tana River, which event will probably take place in April or May, but provision has been made only up till 31st March 1912. Met from Savings on Police Vote.

Item 12. The following causes are responsible for the additional expenditure.

- (1) ~~Indent for Subsistence and眷属~~ was ordered to September 1910 was not paid for until ~~September 1911~~.
- (2) ~~The Chinese and Protectorate account for March 1911~~ was not received until after the Protectorate accounts for 1910-11 were closed.
Net from General Savings.

Item 13. This is the probable expenditure in connection with Mr. Leaven's (Entomologist) present tour of investigation in the Coast Lands of the Protectorate prior to his proceeding to Europe. Net from General Savings.

Item 13. This is due to the larger number of time expatriates who have lately taken their discharge than anticipated when the estimates were prepared. It is difficult to estimate for this vote as it is impossible to say how many men will take their discharge in the course of a year.

Item 14. The following causes are responsible for the additional provision required.

- (1) Freight on stores taken over last year from the Germanium Expedition having to be paid for during the current year.
- (2) Freight charges on rations, maize and general stores paid to the Emperor Navigation Company sent from Gobwon to Serenli.

Item 14 (contd.)

(ii) The impossibility of accurately estimating for the freight on food as to be transported to the Northern Frontier District Stations from Jarrow land.

A sum from Military Reg. Division
200/- General Services.

Item 15. It was necessary, in order to bring the Mangat people under administrative influence and also to endeavour to capture certain members of a scatter, to send a military patrol to Mangat. The expenditure was unforeseen, but the gravity of the case necessitated action being taken. It is hoped to meet this from General Services.

Item 16. This amount is required to purchase a new flagstaff to replace the one at Gashenabari fort in which signs of rot are visible. It is therefore necessary to have a new ^{one} at once. Not from Savings on Port and Marine Votes.

Item 17. This is to provide for the wages of 6 native telegraph learners for the period from 1st December 1911 to 31st March 1912. The Postmaster General has a number of educated natives under training to become telegraphists, their progress however warrants their receiving wages and they made representation to that effect. Unless some payment could be provided they would probably seek employment elsewhere and all their training in telegraphy would then have been wasted. Savings on Post Telegraph Votes.

Item No. This sum was required to effect purchases of quantities of improved maize and beans for issue to the natives in the Province of Timbo and Daga before the sowing season commenced as the Director of Agriculture could not supply the quantity required from the Native Government Stores. Savings on Agricultural Department Vote.

Item No. An representative increase in the minimum of the scale of salary assigned to the Chief Computer from £100 to £200 and the balance for the additional staff of 2 computers with salaries on a scale not exceeding £200 by £10 to £100 to cope with the work, which it has been found impossible for the present staff to carry out, mentioned in G.O. despatch No. 730 of 15th December 1911. Savings on Survey Department vote.

Item No. The Director of Public Works reported that the amount allowed in the estimates is proving insufficient to meet the requirements up to 31st March 1912. To enable him to carry out the necessary maintenance work on Civil Buildings a sum of £175 has been diverted from the vote "Upkeep of Veterinary quarantine stations" on which equivalent saving will be made. Re-allocation.

Item No. This amount was required for a small addition above the strong room of the General Post Office which will ultimately be required and for the erection of which arrangements were made when the building was first opened. It was thought advisable to carry out this work as soon as the Extension of the Sorting Office was completed so that the material on the site could be
