was one of those which came under our notice.

I am distinctly of opinion that an offender, such
as described by Mr. Cresswell, ought not to be
sent to a reformatory. The punishment ought to
be summary.

In brief, I do not hesitate to say
such a case. But the reformatory ought not
to be used except in the case of an offender who
is essentially (I understand to use the phrase
"hardened criminal" of a child)

I must say I have some doubts as to the expediency
of establishing a regular reformatory near Leicester
at a cost of £1,000 - when many are much
wanted. - When such a case is known
But I should like to see the details.

law many criminals who are merely waiting for opportunities but it is not easy to discriminate and many persons who are merely vagrants, and in many cases mere lads, find their way to gaol where association with hardened criminals can only tend to corrupt and vitiate them.

5. In the absence of a Reformatory there is no alternative course, and we are slowly increasing the criminal class and instituting a state of affairs which must be avoided.

6. It is under these circumstances that I have the honour to commend the necessity for building a reformatory to Your Lordship's gravest consideration.

7. Should Your Lordship assent to this expenditure, it is proposed to build this reformatory on the Government Experimental Farm about 5 to 6 miles from Nairobi, where a constant supply of labour is always required.

8. Juvenile criminals instead of having their criminal propensities intensified by the contact with hardened criminals would receive useful instruction in Agriculture and would be a source of real benefit to a community that is constantly in want of labourers with a knowledge of English Agricultural methods.

9. In conclusion I would add that Mr. Winston Churchill to whom I briefly outlined this scheme for the reform of juvenile offenders, has expressed his strongest approval of it.
