Requisitions 1050 and 1075.

Sir,

I have the honor to forward a copy of a memorandum
~~Feb 107.~~ with two enclosures from our Shipping Agents with reference
to the shipment of certain Timber and Galvanised Iron for
the Government of East Africa. The estimated cost of the
goods, less freight, and the arrangements for delivery are
as follows:-

Requisition 1050 Galvanised sheets £2,367.
Due for delivery:- 29th March.

Requisition 1075 Timber £13,417.
Date for delivery not yet fixed but cost will be probably
enhanced if an early supply is required.

2. The indent states that the cost is provided for
under the estimates for 1906 - 7, from which we infer that
payment should be made before 31st March, and it is on this
point that we address you.

3. Owing to the severe competition between the
British India Company and the British East Africa Line we
have lately been able to ship the bulk of the stores for the
East Coast Protectorates by regular steamers at the low rate
of 4s/ldd a ton. It will be seen however that if the
shipment of the stores referred to is to be expedited so
that payment may be made by the 31st March the Government of

East Africa will probably have to pay a very much higher rate of freight than if the goods are sent in the ordinary berth steamers.

3. As the demands bear no other indication of urgency and as it is extremely doubtful if we could in any circumstances obtain the whole of the supplies in time for shipment in March we propose with the approval of the Secretary of State to ship by the regular steamers irrespective of the dates of payment. This should we anticipate only cause a few weeks delay at the most, while the saving in cost would be large.

4. I may mention that we have also recently received from the Government of East Africa indents for rolled steel joists, estimated value £1,919 (Requisition 1076) and for mild steel bars estimated value £1,349 (Requisition 1074) and other considerable indents. In all these cases the same considerations apply but it is exceedingly improbable that we shall be able to obtain delivery in time to give effect to this request.

5. We should be glad to know at the earliest possible date whether the Secretary of State approves our proceeding as we propose.

We beg to enclose offers from Messrs Gray Daws & Co. for the British India Steam Navigation Co. and Messrs P.W. Small & Co. for the British East African Line for the conveyance of the Timber &c. for requisition 1075 East Africa Protectorate and the galvanized iron for requisition 1050 East Africa Protectorate from London to Kilindini.

You will notice that the rates asked are much higher than that we have been paying lately viz. 4s/lhd per ton.

Mr. instead of requiring shipment to be made during the current financial year it could be spread over a period to suit the convenience of the both steamer we believe a much lower rate could be got.

In the case of the shipment of Requisition 899 East Africa Protectorate and 1274 Uganda Railways by the "Mombasa" there was great delay in the discharge and it might be more to the convenience of the Colony to have the total quantity delivered in smaller quantities than it would be if shipped in one or two steamers.

It seems doubtful if in any case whether the whole of these requisitions can be ready in time to be shipped to allow of payment being made by the 31st March.
