With reference to your letter No. 13616/1907
of the 25th of April last and subsequent correspondence
respecting the thirtysix police constables required for service
in the Nairobi Police, I have the honour to enclose herewith



age and health.

1. Candidates should be over 24 years of age, ^{Medical Officer} unmarried, and certified by ~~the CA~~ as fit for service in the East Africa Protectorate. ~~and must be in good health.~~
~~No person shall be accepted who is not physically fit.~~
~~The Surgeon's fee will be paid by him to rule.~~

Period of service.

2. The period of service will be for three years from the date of arrival in the Protectorate, and selected candidates will be required to enter into an Agreement ~~subject to the following conditions.~~ with the CA for the term of the following conditions.
~~Inspections of the East Africa Protectorate, subject to the above mentioned conditions.~~

3. On the satisfactory termination of his employment a Constable may be granted 3 months leave of absence with half salary if he does not renew his agreement.

If re-engaging for further service he may be granted leave according to the rates in force at the time for European subordinates in the Protectorate.

4. 3rd class Railway fare from place of residence to the port of embarkation and a 3rd class ocean passage to the Protectorate will be given to selected

selected candidates, and similar passages home on unsatisfactory termination of employment or in the event of their being invalided out of the Protectorate by reason of ill-health other than that due to personal misconduct.

In case of death or disablement
for any other cause than those indicated, Constables will be liable to such provisions of the
Incentive Agreements mentioned in section 8 as may
be applicable to the deceased.

5. The Sgt will receive ~~an outfit~~ ^(including) at the fixed
rate of ~~Rs~~ [£] 120 per month.

~~not~~ ^{not} free quarters or an allowance
on foot thereof.

6. Free outfit on the usual scale will be provided
them, and Khaki uniform on arrival in the
Protectorate.
