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My dear Sir Clement,

The position in the Zouk has turned out to be exactly what I told you I thought it was when you were here in the spring.

These two people connected with East Africa Syndicate, namely Edward Davis, G. Salomon and Pauling, the railway people who have quietly been doing all they can to prevent the business going through on proper lines. Our likes are too honest and there is not enough water for them. I had to be in Glasgow on Friday 12th for the launch of one of our steamers and they took the opportunity to call a meeting of the Directors giving only 12 hours notice. The notices were sent out on the Thursday night consequently at the meeting only Davis, Pauling's representative and Verulam were present. They then proceeded to give themselves an option on the property for six months on the following lines:-

Capital: £150,000 in £1 Ordinary shares.

£450,000 Pauling for railway.

£100,000 Working capital.

£125,000 to those finding the money.

£ 70,000 East Africa Syndicate.

£ 5,000 Gordon Salomon.

The

The reason of the option is that Gordon Salomon who was supposed to be working for the East Africa Syndicate has I understand entrusted some American Soda people in the business which they think will facilitate their getting the money for the Railway.

I have a Letter from Pauling dated a year ago after the survey offering to build the railway for \$50,000 and underwrite 100,000, so that above you the water there is hidden up in the pride of the Railway. On these lines half the Capital will be watered and the East Africa Syndicate shareholders will be defrauded of their rights by these men.

This is the game this man Davis plays with everything.

I am determined that this business shall be run on proper lines if at all and have placed the whole matter in the hands of a good firm of lawyers in the City. If I am obliged to I shall make the whole thing public.

But the whole of this rascality can be stopped if the Colonial Office will exercise the same control that Lord Cromer did in Egypt and say that before this Soda proposition is floated they must approve the terms of the flotation, i.e.

The Capital of the Company.

The Railway Contract.

The Commission paid for underwriting.

The Vendors interest.

In the interest of East Africa this must be done.

People

People will never invest money in East Africa if they are open to be robbed in this manner. It has been commonly done in Rhodesia and look at the result. I will send you on copies of the correspondence I have had with J. Davis upon this subject which will prove what I say. - That I sincerely hope you will place the whole before the authorities at the Colonial Office.

I have the interest of East Africa at heart in this matter and I only want to see this business run on proper lines.

My dear Sir Clement,

I will send you the whole of the correspondence as soon as I can get it from my lawyer.

I called a meeting of the Directors yesterday at 2.30; only Verulam and Clarence Wilson attended.

Verulam is of course Chairman of the Syndicate and was present at the meeting on Friday 12th when according to Mr. Davis and the Secretary they understood to grant this option to Messrs Pauling (which is really Davis and family).

On the minutes being read yesterday Verulam was astounded to find that the Secretary had entered on the minutes that this option would be given to Paulings

As owing to all of us being absent he had decided that no option should be given - but that the words should be 'if Messrs Pauling send in a scheme on or before July 31st it will be considered by the Directors in a friendly spirit' (words to that effect).

The Secretary produced a memorandum from Mr. Davis which ordered him to enter in the minutes that the scheme would be accepted.

Verulam is furious at the minutes being tampered with in this way and is entirely with us in our opinion of the scheme.

This therefore finally decides the point that the option is not yet given. But we are not out of the wood. This man Davis is clever and cunning and means

to get the property into his hands if he can, and if he does he will float it off well watered, sell his own shares at a large profit and then leave it a ruined concern to the detriment of East Africa.

He is a Director of some 40 Companies they have all been treated the same way, none pay dividends and have been copiously watered.

I am not going to see this done with anything I am concerned in, and as far as the East Africa business is concerned.

The railway must be built on 10% profit basis to the contractors.

The underwriters must have a fair commission and no more.

All those who have worked such as Messrs the Chemists and others must be properly remunerated and there must be no water, it will be ruin to the country as far as shareholders of the East Africa Syndicate are concerned. I think they should receive 25% of the profits after those who put up the money have received 5%.

The East Africa Syndicate have spent some £70,000 in the country and therefore I do not think that is too much to give them.

In Egypt Lord Cromer took very good care to prevent the haphazard flotation of these impossibly watered Companies and it will be ruin to East Africa if the same care is not taken.

It would be quite easy for the Colonial Office to say that any railway which is built must be

built

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Built on the basis of a 10% profit to the contractors and no more. I have a letter written some time back by Messrs Pauling offering to build on this basis and in fact any Railway Contractor will do this.

The commission paid for underwriting must not exceed a percentage to be definitely fixed.

The Vendor's interest must not exceed a certain proportion. Also the Colonial Office in a matter of this sort should have the right to appoint a Director to the Board.

The soda business is either nothing or it's an enormous commercial transaction, which will be of the utmost importance to the welfare in East Africa.

If it is no good it must never be floated into a Company, on the other hand if it is of great commercial value then those who put up the money must have a fair proportion. But East Africa must also benefit.

I have satisfied myself that this property is of great commercial value and you shall have every document in connection with the business as you will see I have interested commercial people of the highest standing in the business and it is to the interest of East Africa that these people should give their help rather than the property should be seized and set up as it were by those silly Jews.

Winston Churchill is going out to East Africa. He had better have all the papers and go and see the property for himself.

I am still endeavouring to get further people into it.

We now know we can place large quantities in
London and the East.

I will collect all the papers and send them
on to you.

My dear Sir Clement.

I did not get your letter in time to call at 12 noon Friday, as I did not return to Pol. station

Owing to Verulam's action at the last meeting the option is not given to make financial shares, and they will not get the property to float off on the Public at their own sweet will - without a public scandal as I shall never allow one and a half of water to be put into the Company.

It will however as I say stop all their plotting and scheming if the Colonial Office issue an edict that before flotation they must approve the financial scheme of any Company. And in this par-

ticular Company which will be of great importance to East Africa the Colonial Office ought to retain the right to nominate a Director who would sit on the Board. This could be done without his name appearing at all, and it never need be known publicly that the Government was in any way represented. I have no hesitation in saying that the financial schemes which are put through daily in connection with Rhodesia, the Transvaal and West Africa, are a curse to the countries upon which they are perpetrated -

and

and they are undoubtedly the cause of the great depression at the present time.
