I have now been able to obtain the instructions of my Principals upon your letter of the 18th January last.

With reference to Clause 3 of that letter, my Principals agree that a detailed survey with plans and specifications of the line should be made by Government Engineers and the line built to those plans. My Principals are prepared to deposit with H. M. Government an estimated amount in cash to cover cost of survey and plans, so soon as a draft Agreement is settled upon between H. M. Government and themselves, such Agreement to be signed only after my Principals have given H. M. Government good and substantial securities and assurances that the railway will be built according to such plans and specifications.

With reference to Clause 4, Sec A) my Principals agree to meet the objection raised by arranging to have the 50,000 acres in alternate blocks of 1 mile square. (Sec B) they would agree for every tree cut and exported to plant 3 trees. They consider it is as much

In their interest as in that of H. M. Government that the forests should be kept intact.

With reference to Clause 5, my Principals are willing to agree to always put a full load on trucks provided that the railway provides suitable trucks that will carry 10 or 20 tons of timber. My Principals point out with reference to the $\frac{1}{2}$ d per ton per mile, that capitalists will not invest their money in a branch line in a new Country without some guarantee of the kind. They point out that the rate does not appear to be an unreasonable one that the Uganda Railway is cheaply operated and that timber is hauled in Canada at $\frac{1}{2}$ d per ton per mile.

With reference to the proposed subvention if the amount suggested is considered too much and will stand in the way, my Principals will be contented with 35 1/3rd per cent less.

As my Principals are very anxious to proceed in the matter and urge me to let them hear the views of H. M. Government on this emended proposal with the least possible delay, may I venture to hope that I may have a reply to this letter at the earliest possible moment. I trust that Mr Hutchins has now made his report mentioned in your letter of the 15th ulto.

Lord Elgin does not
consider that it turns
profoundly in your letter
now from the basis
of a satisfactory agree-
ment.

3. The land grant
asked for amounts
to some 5 square miles
of land & including
what is at present
valuable forest is much
too great. The character
& value of the forest is
at present imperfectly
known, but, assuming
that there are 50 trees to
the acre and taking

their value at Rs. 2 each,
which is the average ¹²⁷ for all
by Messrs. Swinton &
Lygon under their
existing leases, the
value of the grant of
first land alone
for which you ask (114,000
acres) would amount to
Rs 114,400,000 or
more three-quarters of
a million pounds.

4. The subscription on
the amount of timber
carried by the Uganda
Railway - differs little
in view of the fact that
minimum rates are also
asked for - from a quantity
of timber that is accordingly
unadmirable.

5. On the older land
Elgin does not see
