I have the honour to state
that I was appointed an
Assistant in the Treasury of
the British East Africa Pro-
tectorate on the 8th of June
1905 for my departure was
given £ 55, in which was
included £ 7.10, to cover
cost of passage &c.

I respectfully submit there-
fore that inasmuch as I

was originally granted on
appointment the £ 2.10. for
incidental expenses; I am
entitled to the continued
payment under section 3 of
the Regulations issued on
1st Jan: 1904, which were
handed me with my letter
of appointment on arrival in
East Africa, which I enclose
for your perusal.

I therefore hope that under
these circumstances my
application to be paid the
sum will receive favourable
consideration.

I may add that this sum 339

1904.

Regulations for the Employment of Officers in the British Protectorates in Uganda and the East Coast of Africa.

1. APPOINTMENTS on the staff of the Protectorate are made by the Secretary of State. Officers holding such appointments are subject to the Regulations laid down for which may hereafter be laid down, by the Secretary of State, or by the Commissioner with the approval of the Secretary of State.

2. All appointments to the administrative, military, or clerical branches of the Protectorate service are subject to one year's probation from the date of the holder's first arrival in Africa. If, at the expiration of this period, the officer is reported by the Commissioner or Acting Commissioner to have shown himself sufficiently qualified for his employment in the Protectorate without further training, full pay will be paid. This Regulation does not affect the several rights of the Secretary of State to terminate the appointment of any member of the Protectorate service whenever he may see fit to do so for the public advantage.

3. Officers proceeding to their posts on first appointment from any place in Europe will be granted a sum of £50 to meet the cost of their passage to Bombay, which will be issued by the Crown Agents or the Colonies, or by arrangement by the officer of the usual carriage Agent in Europe. Officers proceeding to their posts on first appointment from any place in Europe will be allowed their reasonable travelling expenses, duly supported by vouchers.

4. Officers, on proceeding to their posts, are paid half salary from date of embarkation, and full salary from the date of leaving the coast for the interior.

Full pay may only be claimed on journeys from or to the coast, for the period of time spent in a direct journey. Should this period be exceeded, full salary is not paid unless a satisfactory explanation of the cause of delay is given. If an officer is on sick leave, he is considered as being on sick leave during the period of his detention, and receives pay accordingly; but exceptions may be made by the Secretary of State in regard to the winds of sickness.

5. Officers are entitled, when travelling on official business within the Protectorates or the adjoining territories connected with their administration, to payment of their reasonable travelling expenses, duly supported by vouchers. The extent of these travelling expenses is controlled within certain limits at the discretion of the Commissioner and Consul General.

6. Officers, whether military or civil, are entitled to two months' leave annually, provided that the exigencies of the Service permit. They are allowed to accumulate this leave up to six months; that is to say, if they remain at their posts without interruption for one year and eight months, they are entitled to four months' leave; if for two years and one month, to five months' leave; and if for two years and six months, to six months' leave. An officer is not entitled to accumulated leave unless he shall have been on duty in East Africa for a minimum period of one year and eight months.

7. Leave is reckoned from the date of the officer's leaving the African coast until his return to the coast on his way to resume his duties.

8. In the event of an officer proceeding on accumulated leave, he will be paid the full salary of his post for the first three months, and for the remaining period on a proportion of this salary will be deducted for the purpose of providing an allowance for his subsistence.

On the termination of his ordinary leave his salary ceases, unless he is granted sick leave, in which case he is placed upon half-pay for before the day it is caused by circumstances in which he has no control. The breakdown of his leave, in which case the Commissioner has power to cancel the payment of his salary as from the date on which his arrival at the coast would otherwise have taken place, provided that medical officers may be granted an extension of a week, and that on half-pay for the purpose of attending a three months' course at the London School of Tropical Medicine.
