The same ground was gone over again at each Chief's place where a camp was formed. It may be remembered that we had a meeting of Kavirondo Omiefs . over the cotton question at Kisumu in the summer of 1906; unfortunately the Province has since suffered from a shortage of rain, which the chiefs tell me is the reason why I saw on my tour so little result of the advice then given them. I am hopeful that the results of this tour will be better, and that a commencement will now be made of agricultural development in the Province. Mr. Ainsworth is most keen to push Kavirondo and establish an export trade, and Major Leggett who had one of his assistants with him was able to assure the chiefs that spart from other purchases his Company was prepared to purchase all the co-modities of the kinds mentioned they would be able to produce, at rates which were quoted to them. The afwurance f a firm market for all produce brought in secmed to have a good effect, and as a further inducement I offered a reward of Re. 100/- to the Chief whose people prought in the largest quantity of cotton action the next rains.
