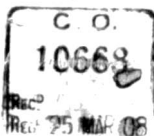

The Governor of the East Africa Protectorate to the  
Secretary of State for the Colonies

(Received Colonial Office, 5.25 p.m. 24th March, 1908)

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24th March, Conduct of Lord Belmore and Mr. Baillie  
in connexion with proceedings reported in my telegram  
of today is in my opinion so serious and so gross an  
insult to this Government and His Majesty's representa-  
tive that I have suspended both of them, under section  
13 of the Royal Instructions, from their duties on  
the Legislative Council. In informing them of this I  
have added that I am recommending the removal of their  
names from the list of unofficial members and that if  
they think fit to send me any explanation I shall be  
happy to submit it in forwarding that recommendation.

With reference to your telegram of March  
23<sup>rd</sup> no. 63 and March 24<sup>th</sup> you will of  
course take such measures as may be necessary  
to safeguard yourself as H. K.'s representative  
from organized demonstrations of insulting  
and disorderly character.

It happens to me that the conduct of Lord  
Delamere and Sir Baillie in taking part in  
such a demonstration is incompatible with  
their position as members of the Legislative  
Council, and I fully approve of your  
action as described in your telegram of  
the 24<sup>th</sup>. I shall be glad to consider  
any explanation of their conduct  
which they may give.
