With reference to the letter (No. 19543) of the 5th August, 1907 and previous correspondence respecting the reclamation and extension works in Kilindini Harbour I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy of a letter and enclosures from the Minister of the Uganda Railway.

1. It appears that for various reasons, the cost of the scheme will be greater than was originally anticipated and I would therefore recommend for Your Lordship's favourable consideration the modification suggested by Mr. Currie, which is estimated to satisfy present requirements in the absence of any immediate prospect of large exports in bulk of natron or timber.

2. Mr. Church, Superintendent of Way and Works, is proceeding home by this mail and it will be well if advantage of his presence in England is taken for a personal consultation with the Consulting Engineers.

3. I may observe that all the work that is being done on Scheme I and in Scheme II if it is proceeded with, will in no way preclude the erection of a deep water pier. All this work must be completed before

On 2nd August 1908 the Colonial Office advised you that necessary sanction had been obtained to the construction of certain works at Killintini estimated to cost £80,000. Following this there was some correspondence ending with Colonial Office despatch No. 739 dated the 16th November 1908 to which reference is made, in which it was stated that Lord Elgin had decided that only part of the work, estimated to cost £35,000, would be proceeded with for the present.

B. In conformity with this ruling work on the restricted scheme has been proceeding and sufficient has been done to enable us to form a fairly correct estimate of what the full work is likely to cost.

I trust you will find that both the £80,000 and £35,000 referred to in the above documents were especially the latter figure, were arrived at on very sketchy data. At this stage it would be almost impossible to form any exact estimate of the total cost of the work.

It would be difficult to give any exact result of calculations as the figures are so far removed from the original estimates and the conditions have changed so much.

I have now received the Superintendent of Way and Works report, another that the total cost of the restricted scheme will have to be taken into consideration when the whole of this work should be proceeded with or whether it should be still further curtailed.

4. The original scheme called a concrete block wall 14' feet long on the south side and a similar wall 835' feet long on the east side. It also was intended to include all the sheds and engine houses shown on plan 45 A. (revised). I must however remark that these sheds really exceed in cost anything I contemplated in those drawings and my opinion is that this is not alone account for practically the whole of the increased cost of these works over the original estimates.

5. The Superintendent of Way and Works submits estimates for works totalling respectively £60,000 and £22,000.

The first includes the construction of the 830' shorter concrete wall on the south side the provision of sheds and engine houses shown in plan 45 A. (revised), the necessary plant etc.

It also provides for completing all the north work, but substitutes stone walls instead of concrete in place of concrete blocks.

It is probable that this scheme will afford sufficient accommodation for our needs for some years

and provides for employing the 1st and  
2nd class labor, i.e., the one million Rs 20,000,  
provides for the construction of the quarter  
(wall 300 feet long on the west side) till the  
erection of the remaining sheds, stables etc.  
(not enclosed red) shown on plan No. 2. (revised).  
It does not include provision for the narrow  
house sheds on the left.

4. I also enclose the my statement of May and  
which you will find on the next page.

5. I hope you will have time to consider for the  
present. It will take another 12 to 18 months to com-  
plete on the question of what would now I should then be  
taken up and be considered.

Mr. A. P. Churchill, Superintendent of Railways,  
will see me up this week and on arrival in London  
will call on the Consulting Engineers. They will doubt-  
less discuss the matter with him before giving an opinion.

On 1st January 1958, the contract for the construction of the new dam at Killindini was signed by the Government of Kenya and the contractor, Mr. J. C. D. Wilson & Sons Ltd., London, U.K. The cost of the contract was £1,200,000. The work was to be completed by 31st December 1959.

The work involved in the construction of the dam is as follows:-  
 1) Excavation of earthworks. This is the most important part of the work. It involves removing soil from the ground. Only earthworks on banks and embankments do not necessitate any removal of load. It pays to try to spoil most of the earth from cuttings. On the other hand however, the whole excavation is required for filling and has to be treated to place where it is required. The actual contract prices for earthworks are the same at Killindini as on the Inyangani Diversion and are as follows:-

Earth soft Rs. 15/- per 1000 c. ft.

" hard " 20/- " "

Rock soft " 22/- " "

" hard " 25/- " "

Added to this will be the cost of rations, lighting and site office, tools and train charges.

The average cost of earth then works out at Rs. 24/- per 1000 c. ft. and rock at Rs. 27/- per 1000 c. ft.

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From experience derived during the last 3 months I find that the actual cost of rockworking is 50 rupees per cubic foot.

The following figures are based on handling and setting

Putting these blocks in position I have estimated another 80 cents per cubic foot giving a total of Rs. 10/- per cu. ft. in labour.

I have quoted the same price of 80/- per cu. ft. throughout the scheme. This includes 75 cents per cu. ft. in labour.

Pitching - The slopes of all earth-work exposed at site will I have estimated at a cost of 35 cents per sq. ft. This has to be done carefully by hand, especially at the R.V. corner where the tide will be out at a great page.

#### Excavation under water -

I have had no experience as to costs of the most of the work but do not anticipate that it will cost less than the figures estimated namely Rs. 100/- per cu. cu. ft. for sand and Rs. 200/- for rock.

Buildings - I have quoted at the same cost as that of the goods shed lately arrived from England for Port Blair. That is, Rs. 100/- per foot run and have allowed Rs. 25/- per foot run for the erection.

Plant - Includes a concrete mixer, 2 - 10-ton cranes, trolley, lights and crane and a weighbridge, with the exception of the weighbridge all the plant to be on site.

The cost of the plant is to be started off at the rate of Rs. 10/- per day.

A sum of Rs. 50,000 has been allowed for contingencies in Scheme No. 3, as there will be the cost of repairing the needles to min. Also the remaining
