The Governor of the East Africa Protectorate to the
Secretary of State for the Colonies.

(Received, Colonial Office 6.32 p.m., 9th September, 1908)

No. 152. Your telegram of 27th August Cave
telegraphs that he considers 1 years notice dis-
continue payment of compensation too short but as
compensation has been paid for eleven years he cannot
say that so far as Zanzibar concerned objections to
proposed reduction are serious. Here it is quite
different. Compensation has not been running 1 year
limit proposed was the least considered advisable for
the coast after consultation with leading Arabs
strongly deprecate any curtailment. I cannot expect
all claims to be filed without allowing reasonable
time and I am anxious not to jeopardise delicate
political measure which has so far been carried out
successfully.

With ref. to your letter of the 14th Aug., no. 27003/08, on the subject of the abolition of slavery in Zanzibar and the E.A. Prot., I am to transmit to you, to be laid before Sec. Sir E. Grey, a copy of a tel. received from the Gov. of the Prot. regarding the period during which compensation should be payable.

2 In view of the considerations adduced by Col. Badler, the S. of S. proposes, if Sir E. Grey concurs, to authorize the introduction of the draft Ordinance ~~—~~
 which a copy was (enclosed in your letter under reference) on which the period of suspension was fixed at 3 years approximately.

3 Although the main reason for the prolongation of the period in the E.A.P. does not apply to Zanzibar, it appears to have been that, for the sake of suspending it would be sensible to fix the same date for the termination of the period of the compensation period in the Zanzibar decree.
