My Lord,

With reference to my despatch No. 461 of September 11th I have the honour to transmit herewith a letter from the Principal Judge containing certain items which he proposes to insert in the Estimates for the forthcoming year together with a memorandum by the Treasurer on the subject. I concur in the recommendations made which in view of the increased work entailed by the transfer of the Court of Appeal to the Mainland appear to me to be necessary and I have the honour to submit them for Your Lordship's favourable consideration.

The question of increased pay for the Magistrates and the 3rd Judge has formed the subject of correspondence (vide despatch 389 of September 19th 1907) and in view of the opinions expressed by Lord Elgin in his despatch confidential of October 29th 1907 I do not propose to make any further suggestions at present. Expressing however that the proposals put forward in my despatch No. 85 of



October 5th to place District Commissioners on an incremental scale of pay, are sanctioned, this would also apply to Magistrates.

S. I have sanctioned the expenditure asked for in the last paragraph of Judge Hamilton's letter of a sum of £120 on improving the present Court accommodation at Yaffrobt, funds are available from savings on the Public Works Department Vote and I trust that my action will meet with Your Lordship's approval.

Your Excellency,

As it will be necessary to make special financial provision to meet the needs of the Judicial Department in the forthcoming financial year, I have the honour to submit in detail under various headings the following suggestions and recommendations for your consideration.

2. I take this opportunity of approaching you on the subject before the annual estimates are made up as some of the points to be considered are in the nature of novel or extraordinary requirements needing special sanction.
3. The transference of the Appeal Court to the Mainland, which should now be effected within the course of the next four months, will at once render necessary an increase of the clerical staff. It will also considerably increase both the work and responsibility of the Registrar of the High-Court who will, I presume, be appointed to be also Registrar of the Appeal Court. I would therefore recommend that there should be an allowance of £50 a year for the Registrarship of the Court of Appeal or £5 a month, to be drawn by whoever holds the double appointment, i.e., that were the Registrar on leave the allowance would at once be drawn by his Deputy.
4. The Clerical staff I propose to increase by three.  
 (1) a clerk of appeal who would have charge of the whole of the Appeal Court work as well as of the

Appellate and Revisional work of the High Court, (2) one junior Clerk (3) one typist.

This increase added to the present staff should be sufficient to cope with the Appeal Court work and to ease the pressure that we are experiencing with the existing staff at the present time.

5. The cost of this proposed increase would work out as follows for next year.

6. Another difficulty to be set the saving in cost to the Government by the move, and the fees that will be taken by the new court. The figures which I have obtained relating to these heads show the following results:-

1. Expenses of instructing Pleaders in London	Rs. 700
2. Expenses of another Judge visiting Norbury	380
3. Fees taken in the Court of Appeal average	1200

7. It therefore appears that the transfer will mean an immediate increased cost of about £130 to the Government but, as I have taken a conservative figure for the fees, and it would have been necessary to ask for an additional Clerk to the existing staff in any event, this increase is, in reality less than it seems; and I am confident

it will shortly be entirely wiped out by increased revenue directly due to the establishment of the Court on the Mainland.

7. I have already addressed Your Excellency on various occasions on the question of the increase of pay of the 2nd Judge and of the Magistrates and it will be unnecessary here to do more than refer to the subject with the hope that the matter may be finally settled and the increases asked for allowed in the forthcoming estimates.

8. I now come to the question of Court accommodation at Nairobi which has become most serious. The last occasion on which I referred to it was in my annual report last June, and since that date I have had the misery of the matter again brought home to me both by personal inspection and experience and by the unanimous representation of the Pleaders practising in the Court.

I have already enlarged at some length on the ~~cost~~  
and inconvenience of the present arrangements which not only lack dignity, comfort and decency, but have lately led to the loss of money, valuable documents, and Court records. I have had recently to increase the Clerical staff of the Town Magistrate's Court to cope with the work which brings in a revenue of about £1200 a year, with the result that not only is there insufficient space for the Clerks and the Court records but the public and Pleaders are unable to find bare standing room in the office and the delays and mistakes consequently caused in the transaction of business have become a serious

reproach to the Administration of the Department.

9. I have therefore to beg Your Excellency to see that provision may be made for the commencement of the permanent building next year. The necessity that has existed in the past has further emphasized now by the fact that the Court of Appeal will have to confine its sittings to Mombasa until adequate provision can be made at Nairobi.

As, however, it will be impossible to hope, even if the estimate be passed, that a new Court will be available before 1910 I have to ask that special sanction for extra office accommodation may be given now to tide over the interval and that I may be permitted to arrange with the Commissioner of Works for an addition to the existing office. I believe that the expenditure of £120 would be sufficient to meet our immediate requirements.

## MEMORANDUM.

I have discussed this matter at length with His Honour the Principal Judge and recommend his proposals in their entirety.

1. EXTRA STAFF. I am satisfied that three additional clerks are really necessary. Even if the Court of Appeal were not moved, one additional clerk would be required.

2. I think the duty allowance of £5/- a month for the Registrar of the Appeal Court is justified in view of the additional responsibility which will have to be undertaken by the Registrar of the High Court. Further it is no longer probable that Registrars will rise to the very high position attained by their predecessors and I do not think it would be fair to give them increased work and responsibility without an increase of pay.

3. The salary of the Magistrates would depend on that of the District Commissioner, i.e., if the both are placed on incremental scale the former would also. This has, I believe, been admitted by the Colonial Office.

4. I understand Your Excellency is considering the whole question of the salaries of the Judges.

5. As a temporary measure I would suggest adding to the existing Court buildings at Nairobi. The £150

could be obtained by a re-allocation from Public Works Department Item 18 where there is £242 still available.

I approve of your making provision in the above estimates for the increased judicial staff necessitated by the transfer of the Court of Appeal to the Nairobi.

Provision may also be made for raising the Magistrates on an incremental scale of salary, rising from £400 p.a. to £100 by increments of £20; but I cannot consent to an increase of the Sir Judge's salary now presented.

I approve of the expenditure of £100 on improving the Court accommodation at Nairobi, the cost being met or exacted in the sum named, of your Desp. under reply.
