My Lord,

I have the honour to refer to the correspondence ending with Your Lordship's despatch of the 12th of June last.

2. The action I took in connection with the incident at Government House in March last and which met with the support of Your Lordship and Lord Milner has vindicated the dignity of the Governor's Office.

3. Now that eight and a half months have elapsed, that the cause of order has been maintained, and the attitude of those concerned in the demonstration has been correct and reasonable, I consider the time has come when a veil may be drawn over the past, leniency shown, and the two suspended members be reinstated in the Legislative Council.

4. This would be looked upon as a graceful act, and go far to strengthen the friendly feeling between the Official and non-Official communities which now exists, and which I cannot think has ever been so strained as the incident

5. I have accordingly, subject to Your Lordship's approval, the honour to recommend that the names of Lord Delamere and Mr. Willis may be submitted to His Majesty for reappointment in the Legislative Council.

6. In submitting this recommendation I would wish that my reasons became clear. I in no way alter the opinions I have already expressed. I look upon the attitude Lord Delamere took up with regard to this Administration as just to be regretted; but I recognise that he has done more for East Africa in developing his large estates than anyone else who has interests in the country, and that he is the leader in whom the settlers have the greatest confidence and whom they are prepared to follow. To reinstate him and his colleague now would give general satisfaction, besides removing any impressions that may exist that the administration is actuated by vindictiveness or is lacking in sympathy with the settlers.

7. I am further anxious to terminate the feeling of anxiety as to how long the present position, with two members for the viceregal party on the Council, is to last, and I think such an important measure as the Land Bill calls for a second reading two months
