Baker, A.C.G. Age 37; single; educated in Somerset and at Maidstone; employed as a private tutor after leaving school; appointed a constable in South African Constabulary 1901; Sub-Inspector 1903; and now re-franchised. (2365)

Reports: Assistant Inspector-General Fair:- A very able hardworking Police Officer, a clean and straight young man and thoroughly reliable. I have the greatest confidence in recommending him".

Inspector-General Curtis:- "Has been well reported on throughout his service and gained his commission from the ranks after about two years' service therein".
