The East Africa Native Affairs Ordinance No. 1 of
1907 and its 1908 Amendment, by virtue of which
of Native Intoxicants and the imposition of a tax on them,
for example:

In the proviso to Section 21 of that Ordinance His
Excellency was empowered to suspend the operation of the
Ordinance in so far as it relates to the tax on trees until
the December 31st 1908. The object of this Ordinance
enable His Excellency to further suspend the imposition of
the tree tax as it is considered that owing to improved
condition of the owners of shambas on the Coast due to a
considerable extent to the abolition of the legal status
of slavery, this tax will not be levied.

His Excellency is hereby requested to proclaim that
the tax shall be levied from such date as he may think fit.

This is an Ordinance to which His Excellency may
properly give his assent.
