THE CUSTOMS AMENDMENT ORDINANCE 1906.

This Ordinance has been passed by the Council as a temporary measure pending the enactment of a General Customs Management Ordinance.

Mr. Major on taking over the duties of Chief of Customs reported to His Excellency the fact that in his opinion the manner in which goods imported into or exported from the Protectorate were declared for Customs purposes made it extremely difficult to detect and therefore prevent fraud by the public and by subordinate officers in his department, and he advocated immediate legislation requiring all goods imported and exported to be entered in the manner and form prescribed in the Gold Coast Customs Ordinance 1876.

The forms prescribed by the last mentioned Ordinance and each of its provisions relating to the declaring of goods imported or exported as are suitable and are immediately required remedy the defect in the East Africa Customs Regulations have been incorporated in this Ordinance.

In my opinion His Excellency should assent to this Ordinance.
