 require settlement.

I think we should reply that

 subject to certain modifications in
 minor details which it may be deemed
 desirable to make - but with what has

 were approved when the reasonable

TREASURY CHAMBERS

March 1908

Sir,

The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have had before Them Mr. Attrebus' letter (30021/1907) of the 11th October last, further with regard to certain conditions of employment in the Protectorates of East Africa and Uganda.

In reply I am to say that in deference to the recommendation of Set^r [unclear] in view of the information received by the Indian and Native Labour Department, the Lordships are inclined to accept the proposal that, at any rate, the same leave rules (as far as regards superior officials) shall be applied to all permanent European Officers in the two Protectorates. Their Lordships presume that the number of subordinate posts to which pensionable Europeans are appointed will be kept within the narrowest possible limits, and that Indian and native labour will be employed in such subordinate appointments as far as possible.

My Lords note that the Secretary of State agrees that appointments (if any) carrying a salary of less than £100 per annum, including persons of European extraction, shall be regarded as non-pensionable.

As regards the proposals concerning Subordinates (other than in the Railway Department) contained in the enclosures

enclosures to Mr. Just's letter (45761/1906) of 30th May last.
My Lords observe that no recommendations have been made
by the Secretary of State. These proposals, presumably,
have been, or will be, examined in detail in your Depart-
ment, and, on hearing further on this point, Their Lordships
will be happy to give favourable consideration to any
recommendation which the Earl of Elgin may think proper
to make with regard thereto.

In conclusion I am to express Their Lordships
regret that owing to pressure of other business this matter
has been so long delayed.
