Sir,

In reply to your letter of the 30th ultmo (8773/1908), I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to request you to inform the Earl of Crewe that Their Lordships are prepared to agree that, when an officer is transferred from a professional office in a British Colony or Protectorate, to which an addition of years is attached for pension purposes, to a similar office in one of the East African Protectorates, these additional years shall be included in the calculation of his final pension on the understanding that the portion of the pension resulting from such addition will be defrayed by the Colony or Protectorate which first employed him.
