Sir,

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Antrobus's letter of the 22nd ultimo (20236/1908), in which the Earl of Crew recommends the appointment of a Cotton Inspector in the East Africa Protectorate for two years, at a salary (which, as Their Lordships understand, it is proposed to charge to the Head of Agricultural Department) of £250 for the first year, and £300 for the second.


In reply I am to remind the Secretary of State that the British Cotton Growing Association has been granted a subsidy of £1,000 per annum for three years for the purpose of developing Cotton Cultivation in the Protectorate. My Lords are not informed what the duties of the Inspector will be; but if the appointment of such an officer is thought desirable, They consider that his salary should be provided out of the funds already at the disposal of the British Cotton Growing Association without additional charge to the Protectorate.

I am to ask when a Cotton Inspector was appointed in Uganda.
