Sir G. Wellett is a retired Solicitor to the Customs and is known to us as a member of a Syndicate which proposed to take over the Jelly-Biggs concession. He tells me he has now dropped these except the Voi-Taveta Railway scheme which is purely visionary.

He is now forming a Syndicate to take over leases of 2 fibre concessions which have ^{been} promised to Mr. Handcock and Mr. Abbott.

There are similar concessions of 10 square miles each on the Sabaki River. Term of lease 25 years. Lessee to spend £5,000 on the property in 5 years and to deposit £1,000 as proof of bona fides. Rent Rs. 750 per annum. Royalty 5 per cent on produce for the first 3 years and thereafter 10 per cent.

On ~~answering~~ the Secretary of State expressed a doubt whether these terms were not too liberal as regards area and length of lease, and accordingly when Mr. Geddes (1938/02) applied for a transfer of these same leases we told him that the transfer would only be allowed subject to conditions embodying the new terms of fibre leases.

But since then Sir J. Badier has reported, subject to a report by Mr. Bullock, in favour of retaining the present conditions (43702).

As far as this goes there is less reason than there was for opposing the transfer.

But the state of affairs as revealed by this

letter

letter and by Sir C. Follett in conversation with me is as follows:-

Hancock and Abbott can't put up their £1000 deposits and therefore can't get their leases.

They have therefore approached Sir C. Follett and his friends, and asked them to find the money for the deposit, on the understanding that on obtaining the leases they will immediately transfer them to Sir C. Follett and Co., for £3,000 and a number of shares. Sir C. Follett accordingly asks us to tell the Land Department to extend the time for making the deposits until he can find the money.

I am not altogether pleased with this proposal by which £3,000 and shares is to be put into the pocket of Hancock and Abbott without their having done anything to the land. But of course they have spent time and money in the country, and ought to have some return.

I am inclined to ascertain from the Governor by telegram, what is the present position as regards these leases, and if they are not already forfeit to tell him to extend the time for the payment of the deposits to 31st March and then tell Sir C. Follett that the time will be so extended and that if the deposits are paid the transfer will be allowed as soon as a Company has been formed and £10,000 paid up on conditions which will make that sum applicable only to the development of the areas leased.

Hon. Sir,

There are, in the East African
Protectorate, two large Concessions, of about
8000 miles each, conceded to Messrs.
Adcock and Abbott, on the River Sabaki.
I am, with friends of mine, negotiating
transfer of these areas, with a view to
indicate or company for working them.

I am informed that the Leases are
draft in the Protectorate Land Office,
for execution, without deposit of £2,000.
Transfers to me, and my friends
not to be completed until the 31st of
each, and must, I am informed, be
subject to your consent. There is, how-
ever, no doubt of our being able to show
you before then full proof of our being
able to take such transfers, with certainty
of working the areas.

My present application is to know if the
rest of the deposits may be postponed
to be contemporaneous with the
transfers to us, if then approved by you.

and if instructions may be kindly
by you to the Land Office in the
Protectorate that the payments were
postponed, and that the Leases
to be held over until then.
