*In my letter No. 891 dated 12th November 1904, when
submitting my proposals for the Staff, I stated, inter
alia, that "in the event of another steamer being sanctioned
the officer who is sent out to East Africa to erect her
should be chosen with a view to his being permanently
retained on the line."*

*In paragraph 8 of my letter No. 187 dated 1st November
last I made provision for such an officer in the proposed
permanent cadre viz: An Assistant Superintendent Marine on a
salary of £400 to £600.*

Mr. R. Grant was originally appointed to East Africa on 20th June 1898 on £360 per annum and returned to England on completion of the "Frigate William Mackinnon" in December 1900. He was again appointed on 15th January 1902 on £480 for the erection of the "Winifred" and "Sail", arrived in East Africa on 3rd February 1902 and returned to England in April 1904.

He has, therefore, already served over four years in this country.

If he is permanently appointed to the Native and admitted to the pensionable cadre it will be necessary to consider whether this past service should count for pension. If it is decided that it shall not, I consider he should be given a permanent post on £600 per annum, service for pension to count from present date of appointment.

I know Mr. Grant to be a reliable and capable man and I shall be glad to see him permanently posted to my Staff.
