We are formulating a Scheme dealing with several commercial and other ideas in connection with British East Africa one of the objects of which will be fostering and assisting emigration to that Protectorate and in so doing appealing specially to farmers Stock Breeders & having on limited means say £200 or £300 a class of Emigrant which up to the present, altho' by no means eminently has not received any considerable amount of attention. The Scheme it is apprehended will develop itself into two to speak branches - (1) To obtaining persons suitable to Scheme - (2) To financially aid such persons in their various callings and enterprise contemplated by said Scheme.

Our object in communicating with you is in reference to Part 1 and our idea when further amplified, we think should appeal to you and in such case secure your co-operation to that part of our project i.e. the finding of persons forming the class answering the requirements of our Scheme.

With regard to the 2nd part, we probably shall not require your co-operation at any rate for the present but incidentally we may mention on the financial point that whilst carrying out the object described mentioned as the same will be associated with certain commercial enterprises the intended operations may be in fact & distinctly more than self supporting.

If the general idea as disclosed in this letter appeals to you we shall be glad to meet you by appointment in order to afford you more in detail the object we have in view.
