

was transferred to the East Africa Protection
on account of ill health.

As I commenced my Colonial career on
the West Coast and although I have
opportunity to do my duty circumstantially
in the East Africa Protection, I feel
my heart is not so much engaged
there, as on the West Coast.

I am now at home a few months here

I have the honour to formally apply for my resignation to be transferred from the British East African protectorate, where I am now serving as an Assistant District Commissioner to an appointment on the West coast of Africa.

I joined the Colonial Service in September 1898 as an Assistant Inspector of the Gold Coast Constabulary, where I served until November 1905, in which month I was transferred to the East Africa Protectorate on account of ill-health.

I am now quite strong again and am very anxious to return to the West Coast Gambia if possible.

As I commenced my colonial career on the West Coast, and although I have endeavoured to do my duty conscientiously in the East African Protectorate, I feel my heart is not so much in it as in the West Coast.

I am now at home on furlough, and am absent, and I arrived in England on the 1st April.

I trust that the Secretary of State for the Colonies will favourably consider this my application
