This is a case in which 5 natives of
Africa are under sentence of death for the
murder of a European engineer Mr London near
Mombasa.

We have been instructed by Mr. Boyce of
Englands the counsel for the prisoners on their
appeal to the Supreme Court in Zanzibar
against the Privy Council for leave to
go to the Privy Council or one in person
material for that purpose & propose to
draw a Petition thereon.

In our opinion there is a practical certainty
of their being granted - The Chief Justice in a
useful judgment found in favour of the
innocence of the accused & was only overruled
by the other two judges evidently the
Supreme Court in Zanzibar - King gave

irregularities were admittedly committed in
the trial of the prisoners or there is an
important question of law as to whether
or not the witnesses against the prisoners
were accomplices & whether their evidence
should be accepted without further
corroboration -

In the meantime we wish to make
certain that sentence will not be carried
out upon the unfortunate prisoners
in East Africa - We are prepared to undertake
to prosecute the proceedings over here
with all despatch & under the
circumstances would ask the Secretary
of State to cable to the Government
officers in Mombasa to temporary
remit the prisoners pending the
