TUBERCULOSIS

Up to March 15th, no cases of tuberculous had occurred in the Protectorate, but on March 15th I conducted post mortems on two imported bulls which had reacted to tuberculin at Government Farm, Nakasha; in one case a small lesion resembling the early stage of tuberculosis was found in one testicle, the bacillus was not demonstrated from this lesion and sections are being cut for histological examination.

In the other case no visible tuberculous lesions were noticed, but the internal glands were in an extremely prostatic condition, sections are also being cut from these.

On March 20th a reported bull calf which had reacted to tuberculin was slaughtered and a very small lesion was cut out in one sub-renal gland. The bacillus was not demonstrated from this lesion and sections are being prepared with a view to histological examination.

Dear Sir: The Acting Chief Veterinary Officer
has the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter
of the 10th inst. regarding the proposed
creation of a Veterinary Bacteriological
Department.

It is not possible for me to
perform the duties of Veterinary Bacteriologist
in addition to the duties of Chief Veterinary Officer
in any event I should have
been considered unless it were possible for
me to perform the present existing conditions.

It is, however, under the present conditions
that a Veterinary Bacteriologist is a necessary
and an important department. I have, therefore,
in England that Veterinary Bacteriologist
is a distinct section of the Veterinary
Department and that a laboratory and apparatus would
be provided for this section. By the Hon. Secy. of State
1900 Veterinary Bacteriological Department was
created in the Government and the Bacteriologist
is a course which seems to me to be in the satisfaction
