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and extent of the balance in respect of returned stores.

From 43701 we learned that the available balance was £163-4-2, inclusive of the value of stores purchased, plus £214 value of returned tools & plant, or £377-4-2, & we accordingly allowed him to draw full pay (less pension charge) instead of $\frac{2}{3}$ pay for the period from 17 Oct 07 to 20 Feb 08 during which he was working at home, instead of giving him an honorarium of £100 as the Govt recommended.

(Mr W. has not acknowledged our letter (of 21st Feb, 43701) & now requests that he may be given the statement of the survey amounts.

We can only conclude that he is dissatisfied with our terms & as he believes there is a large surplus - at least £500, he says - he will, on learning the exact figure, proceed to ask for better terms.

As we understand his obligation to supply the stores or to tell him the exact figure of the balance, neither has he any claim whatsoever to receive any part of it, & if we negotiate - offering him an opportunity of presenting further claims for remuneration which could only be refused.

The rest of his letter backs back to 1905 & matters which have no necessity to raise again.

We should therefore reply that the additional remuneration granted to him was given after Lord C had taken into account the balance of the survey grants & that he has no reason for raising the matter again, as it is now finally disposed of. A plain statement was made that I was away from work through sickness for a long period during part of the time in question. I was ~~united~~ ⁱⁿ my triangulation with Angle former Boundary Surveys for the purpose of proving it. By this work the War Office has now found it to be very exact.
