Mr. Long Innes has shown himself to be a particularly capable Police Officer and I thoroughly endorse Captain Edwards' remarks and venture to recommend his proposals for Your Lordship's most favourable consideration more particularly as I understand that my predecessor's recommendation was only held in abeyance pending its endorsement by him.

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit for His Excellency's favourable consideration the attached recommendations from the Commissioner of Police, having reference to the promotion of Inspector C.S. Long Innes to the rank of Assistant District Superintendent of Police.

I have much pleasure in endorsing the remarks of the Commissioner of Police, as during my recent inspection of the Kisumu District Police, I was most favourably impressed by Inspector Long Innes' work, and the manner in which he had carried out his duties as an acting Assistant District Superintendent of Police and I am well satisfied that he is fully qualified to be confirmed in the appointment. In this connection I would invite a reference to the opinion I recorded on this Inspector's confidential report, forwarded to you under my M.P. No. 20/5/09 dated the 11th instant.

3. It will be remembered that His Excellency in paragraph <sup>36</sup> of his confidential despatch No. 58 of the 18th June 1908 to the Secretary of State strongly supported the recommendations of the late Inspector General of Police regarding the promotion of Inspector Long Innes. It was, however, decided to hold in abeyance all changes and promotions advocated therein until I had had an opportunity of inspecting the Police Force, and of submitting my further recommendations thereon to His Excellency.

4. In view, therefore, of the special circumstances of the case under reference, I venture to express the opinion that it would only be equitable to provide that Mr. Long Innes' seniority in the force should not be allowed to suffer through the unavoidable delay which has been occasioned in confirming him in the rank of Assistant District Superintendent of Police, in which he has acted energetically and successfully for so long a period. With this object in view I desire to strongly endorse the recommendations of the Commissioner of Police that the promotion be antedated for the purposes of seniority from the 18th December 1907, the date on which this Inspector commenced his duties as acting Assistant District Superintendent of Police.

5. In the question of pay, I am in accord with the views expressed by the Commissioner of Police that the salary attached to the appointment should conform

to

to the scale provided under the new scheme of re-organization; that is, a consolidated rate of £250 per annum without increments.

In this connection, the Secretary's of St to the effect No. 214 of the 23rd April 1900 (S.M.P. 986/00) having reference to the present appointment of Mr. Haturin, makes it evident, I consider, that His Lordship has been pleased to approve of the new scale of pay advocated by me for Assistant District Superintendents of Police and I see no reason why the new conditions should be departed from in the case now under reference.

I would, desire therefore, to bespeak respectfully His Excellency's approval of the recommendations contained in this memorandum, and to request that he will be pleased to give them his sanction when forwarding them to the Secretary of State for the necessary sanction.

Sir,

I have the honour to recommend that Inspector C.S. Long-Innes be offered an appointment as an Asst. Dist. Supdt. of Police and that his appointment be ante-dated to 19th December 1907 since which date, with the exception of the period 24-3-08 to 3-9-08 during which he was travelling from Fort Hall to Kisumu, he has acted and carried out the duties of an Asst. Dist. Supdt. of Police.

2. I recommend that the rate of pay of his appointment be £250 per annum which is that set down as the rate of pay of an Asst. Dist. Supdt. of Police in the draft Estimates for 1909-10 provided that if the 2 lately appointed Asst. Dist. Supdts. of Police (Maturia & Lunley) have been appointed on a salary of £250 rising by £15 to £265 I consider that Inspector Long-Innes should also be granted that rate of pay.

3. Inspector Long-Innes has served in the Force since August 21st 1905 and has acted as an Asst. Dist. Supdt. of Police for the last two years with intervals amounting to 3 months only. I have not yet had an opportunity of seeing Inspector Long-Innes but in view of your opinion as shown on his Confidential Report and of the fact that since my appointment to this Force his work has been most satisfactory I consider that he is eminently fitted for the appointment for which I now recommend him.

4. When requesting in para 4 of my No. 4154 dated 21-12-08 that 3 Officers be appointed I pointed out that three vacancies would still be left for the promotion of Inspectors and it is for one of these vacancies that I recommend Inspector Long-Innes.
