In reply to Your Lordship's despatch No. 403 of July 23rd, I have the honour to report that only 2 buildings were erected one for Goanese and one for natives

2. These buildings were not hospitals in the proper sense of the word, but consisted of nothing more than a single long ward made of corrugated iron, one of which was divided by 3 partitions and lined with match boarding. As regards the accommodation for Europeans, the Lunatic Asylum was utilised and no capital expenditure was involved.
