tribes in the Golbo, and the charges against the Abyssinian chiefs being substantiated, their horses and spears were confiscated and they were sent back to Walda Gabriel with a message that any Abyssinian or Boran found intruding south of the red line would be punished and his property confiscated, and that the Balambaras would be held responsible for the consequences. Herr Schubert and I

have supported Mr Zaphire in his action, and a draft report generally has been produced. The German mission was reported to be at Gadaduma, at which place it was proposing to set out at once to me.

With regard to the murder of Mr [redacted] referred to in my Despatches Nos 60 and 67, Vitaurari [redacted] carried out his promise and sent Pilewari W [redacted] Gardula to institute the necessary investigation at Me [redacted].

Several hundred of the principal hunters were assembled before the Vitaurari, and Mr Zaphire brought forward his charges on behalf of the Chiefs from the South whom he had brought with him. Other charges were also made, including

for the arrest of Mr Vincent of the Boma Trading Company and the confiscation of his animals. A long

argument

argument ensued, and it was finally agreed that all the
parties should state their cases before the Emperor or
Mitsurari Napta Giorgis, guarantees being given for their
appearance in Adis Ababa at the end of November next.

I venture to say that the Emperor will be
greatly pleased to see the Emperor in person at the
British interests on the frontier.
