Mr. Read,

I have sent the photographs to the S.O. for reproduction.

I take this opportunity of suggesting that something should be done to meet these petty and irritating objections raised by the S.O. to the reproduction of photographs etc. In this case the sole result of the objection has been a delay of rather over six weeks! If the S.O. would say clearly that they refuse to do these things we should at least know where we are. Not to keep saying that

they cost money and that the Controller hopes the S.O. will be able to do without them &c. is merely wasting time. The presumption is that if the Secretary of State could do without them he would not ask that they might be reproduced.

I suggest that in future no photographs should be sent to me for reproduction unless it is quite clear that they are necessary, and a special minute should be sent to me to that effect. I should then draft an official letter to the S.O. as a matter of course, which would go over with the photographs. I do not think it would be necessary to write to the Treasury, as that would merely increase the delay and stiffen the back of the S.O. They do not ask that Treasury sanction should always be obtained.
