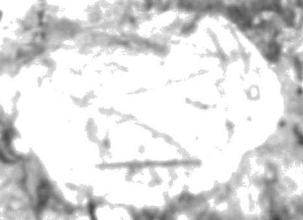

than the proposed safe so that the cash reserve as well
as the notes could be stored therein.

There is ample space for such a strong room
and perhaps a small office at the back of the new
Treasury building.

A strong room in a damp climate like Mombasa
should be provided with a ventilating window.

In suggesting a safe I had not taken into
consideration the question of cost, being only anxious
to secure the best possible receptacle for the notes.
