Years quarantine teams will hit development between Nairobi and Fort Hall for some years. There is difficulty of finding transport animals. It is suggested about £40,000 effected in Jinja and the money can be loaned on same terms proposed for Uganda. This would bring from savings in 1910-11. The loan could be repaid by the construction of a metre gauge railway. The amount of loan would relieve general despatch.

I am inclined to think that  
actions to this proposal will be very  
welcoming in my case. But before you  
have elaborated it, I have been told  
well to do up to point when hand  
transports was considering the m/c  
transport service, which is now I believe  
in operation on the Nairobi - Fort Hall road.  
He asked for some sort of assurance that  
the Govt did not intend to start a motor  
transport service or to construct a monorail

→ April 1904 (or 1905) he was informed that, apart from the question of railway extension to the Kenya forest there is no intention of Government competition on the road within the period stated.

The proposed tramway cannot be regarded as a mere railway extension to Kenya forest. It was certainly suggested that along the alternative high roads to the Kenya forest should be the road from Nairobi to Fort Hall.

I cannot honestly be said that this tramway has any reference to the exploitation of the forest. The forests are not mentioned in the report. The expenditure of £6,000, assuming the same cost per mile as £3,000 as that of the line from Nairobi to Nakuru, would suffice for 20 miles only of Kenya about 120 miles from Nairobi. [Nairobi to Fort Hall is about 50 miles]

My Dear Read,

I have delayed for some time writing privately but you will understand the reasons why. Since my return from my tour in the middle of January I have been somewhat overwhelmed by interviewers and a great many questions of detail which I only wish I could be spared.

The announcement about maize was a very popular one, but immediately afterwards there came as a thunderbolt Macdonald's pronouncement that he had to quarantine practically the whole of the area between here and Fort Hall and to close the roads to transport for at least 2 to 3 years. The Settlers started off with a meeting at Kyambu, the views of which I could not accept as representing the settlers generally. I therefore sought the opinions of the various bodies, and though they are practically unanimous in favor of quarantine they are really in despair as to how they are to carry on reasonable farming operations. I do not see ~~well~~ how we can face the 3 years quarantine unless we give some facilities for getting out their crops which are at last beginning to show up - more particularly in maize and beans. For next year we shall also see 1,000 tons Fibre from the Fort Hall district. The only way out of it seems to be the construction of a light tram for about 30 miles ~~by the~~ ~~River~~ - - -

possible ask for loan of balance on same terms pro-  
posed for Uganda balance amounting to about £40,000 I  
would propose find from specific savings expenditure  
for financial year 1910-11 another £20,000 and apply all  
to construction metre gauge tramway towards Fort Hall  
from Nairobi station. Matter most urgent as quarantine  
board now appointed advocate most drastic measures  
if approval loan granted will relieve general despon-  
dency.

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
