
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EXTRACT FROM MINUTES OF FOURTH MEETING OF THE EAST  
AFRICAN LAND COMMITTEE.

They then proceeded to consider Sir P. Girouard's telegram of the 13th of June as to the propriety of law of the transfer of land in the virgin lands to Asiatics and natives.

As regards lands already granted, it was pointed out that, if the recommendations of the Committee were approved, the object sought by the Governor would be attained, but in another way to that proposed in the telegram, viz. by insisting as a condition of transfer that fewer white persons should be maintained on the land, the transferee than by his predecessor. As to lands hereafter to be granted, the Committee were of opinion that the Secretary of State should adhere to the position taken up in paragraph 20 of Lord Elgin's despatch of 19th March, 1908 viz: that it is not consonant with the views of His Majesty's Government to impose legal restrictions on any particular section of the Community, and that, as a matter of administrative convenience, grants in the upland areas should not be made to natives. The Committee recommended therefore that the Governor should be informed by telegram that the Secretary of State could not sanction the introduction of the proposed Ordinance, prohibiting the transfer of land to Asiatics and natives, but that the Governor should be satisfied in accordance with the general spirit of the despatch of 19th March, 1908, that no grant should be made to any native.
