


Rules under the Diseases of Plants Prevention

Ordinance, E.A.P.

Attention was drawn to the following points.

(1) Should a certificate from the Department of Agriculture of country of origin be accepted?

Would such a certificate be of any value?

(2) What would be the port of entry?

(3) Would it be allowed to land and have all plants fumigated at the port?

(4) Would it be allowed to land and have all plants fumigated at the port of entry?

In view of the procedure indicated the Committee considered it would probably be better to prohibit the fumigation of all plants which will be subject to inspection on their arrival in the Colony.

Imports in Trunks: They introduce infestation, it is therefore desirable that they should be prohibited.

The Committee considered that these points should be put to the Officer Administering the Government.


