

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY  
IN COUNCIL.

**WHEREAS** by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction within the East Africa and Uganda Protectorates:

And whereas by the East Africa and Uganda (Currency) Order in Council, 1905 (in this Order referred to as the Order of 1905), and the East Africa and Uganda (Currency) Order in Council, 1906 (in this Order referred to as the Order of 1906), provision is made with respect to the currency of the two Protectorates, and it is expedient to make further provision with respect thereto:

**NOW, THEREFORE,** His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers vested in Him by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise, is pleased; by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1.—(1) The Governor of East Africa may, with the approval of a Secretary of State, make rules imposing penalties, not exceeding three months' imprisonment and a fine of fifteen

hundred rupees, on any person who defaces, or tears, cuts, or otherwise mutilates, any currency note issued under the Order of 1905:

(2) Nothing in any rules made under this Order shall affect the right of the holder of a currency note to obtain payment thereof in accordance with the provisions of the Order of 1905.

2.—(1) Rules made under this Order shall come into force in East Africa on such day as may be fixed by the Governor of East Africa by proclamation, and subject as hereinafter provided shall extend only to East Africa:

Provided that the Commissioner of Uganda may by proclamation made with the approval of a Secretary of State provide that any such rules shall extend to Uganda and if a proclamation is made to that effect those rules shall as from the date fixed by the proclamation extend to Uganda.

(2) All rules made under this Order shall be judicially noticed, and shall have effect as if contained in this Order.

3. This Order shall be read as one with the Order of 1905 as amended by the Order of 1906, and may be cited as the East Africa and Uganda (Currency) Order, 1910.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury and the Right Honourable the Earl of Crewe, K.G., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein.
