I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of August 28th, 1910, in relation to the fact that certain European officers in the service of the Zanzibar Government have been excluded from the privilege of obtaining a "Traveller's License".

Under the provisions of Ordinance, No. 2 of 1906, they are required to take a "Public Officer's License" (150/- pays for one year or 30/- for a period of fourteen consecutive days).

There are still some who obtain a cheap short-period license of the "Traveller's License" but this is a limited number of the

I would observe that officers of His Majesty's

Army serving at this station are still in the same
position as residents of the East Africa Protectorate in
regard to obtaining licences and it seems somewhat hard

that Lansdown officers should be deprived of the

privileges they formerly enjoyed.

They are, however, officers who are likely to avail
themselves of such a concession and in these circumstances

it would be well to enquire if Your Excellency could see

your way to considering the advisability of extending

the privileges of a "Public Officer's Licence" to officers
