Commercial.

I have the honour to report that on the receipt of your despatch Commercial No. . . of the 16th ultime, I lost no time in consulting the Italian Government as to whether, in the event of the S.S. "Joseph" carrying a patient suffering from leprosy to England from British East Africa, there would be no danger that quarantine measures would be enforced against the vessel on her arrival at Naples.

I have just received the following telegraphic reply from the Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs:

The Director General of the Sanitary Department informs me that no sanitary measures can under any circumstances be enforced against the S.S. "Joseph" - that the patient of my honour's charge is a leper or tubercular, with the exception of an inspection - and that no compulsory (visiting, oblique) - or passenger-classmarking the ship will not be subjected to any sanitary measures for leaving a leprosy patient on board.

On the receipt of your despatch to 3rd Commercial
Lieutenant (30900) of August 26, I at once consulted the
British Technical Delegate on the Quarantine Board with
regard to the conveyance to England of Mr Saxton, who is
thought to be suffering from leprosy...

With reference to paragraph 3. of the Colonial Office
Letter of August 24, Dr Morrison observed that there are
absolutely no restrictions against leprosy in Egyptian
ports; that Egypt is full of leprosy which is hardly re-
garded by the Quarantine Board as a contagious disease.
